

Course Aims

Course Objectives

- to learn ideas about the formation of the scientific image of humanitarian knowledge in the period from the XVI to the beginning. XXI centuries;
- to develop the ability to apply methods and techniques of cultural studies for conducting scientific research in the process of preparing a Ph.D. thesis;
- to develop the ability to conduct scientific historiographic reviews in the field of contemporary cultural studies.

1.4 Learning outcomes

By the end of the course, students will know:

- basic concepts and terms of the discipline;
- features of humanitarian knowledge in culture during the 16th early 21st centuries.

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- apply the methods and techniques of cultural research;
- analyze scientific culturological directions and their methodological strategies;
- actively use the knowledge gained in scientific research;
- present and substantiate the results of scientific research and acquire new knowledge based on culturological methods.

By the end of the course, students will possess:

- methodological basis for conducting a historiographic review;
- the style of scientific thinking in planning cultural research and theoretical understanding of scientific results.
